Analysis of the feedback

The meetings were held with the stake holder of the Institute, in which the stake-holder were provided the feedback enabling the Institute to inculcate their inputs in the planning and routine academic/administrative functioning. The feedback also proved to be instrumental for upgrading the infrastructural facilities up to the satisfaction of stake-holders. The implementation of guardian

suggestion to introduce new science subjects in UG course is under consideration and is finally to be introduced from next academic session. The enhancement of the member of students drive is going on war footing level and group of faculty have approached to stake holders (parents/students) to motivate their wards and friends for higher education. The employer's feedback to initiate professional development programme are considered by the apex authority of the institute. The feedback of students manifest the zeal of the youth for fitness awareness as the demand of sports training and the sports infrastructure were the prime factor in the meeting with students. Alumni Association's suggestion to review the constitution and revise it as per the need of hour has been reported to the apex authority. The analysis of the feedback from anti-ragging committee is quite satisfactory as this is the feather in the institution's cap of non-happening of any ragging activity in this institute since its inception. The anti-ragging cell is vigilant for maintaining the sanctity of the campus. The NSS/NCC activities are being conducted regularly up to the satisfaction of the stakeholders of this remote and backward area of Rajasthan. In general the analysis of the feedback from stakeholders elucidates the efforts of this Institute in the contribution for education and welfare policy in general and the woman upliftment in particular.

7. Innovations and Best Practices

1. Values Based Teaching and Learning

JVBI, an Institute of Higher learning of oriental studies in general and Jainology in particular, is the research based institute established under pious inspiration of Acharya Tulsi, the great saint of his times. 
1. The identified target areas in academic and infrastructure facilities were complied up to the mark of satisfaction of the stake-holders.
